<b>Short course description</b>	Globalisation and Social Policy II addresses global and international dimensions of health and social policy as well as regional and local health and social policies in their interrelationship with global and international developments. In this course, building on Globalisation and Social Policy I, students working on group projects will pass through an entire research process. This process is supported by regular feedback and coaching sessions involving both lecturers and student peers. Groups will work on selected topics towards (i) a final paper in the format of a scientific article (“academic project”) and (ii) an output addressing the broader public, the media or specific stakeholder groups (“going public project”).

<b>Selected readings:</b>	There is no textbook for this class. Student projects build on foundations introduced and discussed in Globalisation and Social Policy I (see Selected Readings for Globalisation and Social Policy I). It is the student responsibility to do the literature search. As part of the coaching and supervision, students are advised on search directions, keywords, key sources, or streams of the literature to be considered.
